"Thank You" to our dedicated SOLCC Preschool Staff during Lutheran Schools Week for the commitment they show in leading children in their walk with Jesus.



The Theology of Stewardship: Encouraging Generous Stewards by Larry Ulrich

"Whoever is of a generous heart, let him bring the LORD's contribution: gold, silver, and bronze... And they came, everyone whose heart stirred him, and everyone whose spirit moved him, and brought the LORD's contribution to be used for the tent of the meeting, and for all its service, and for the holy garments." (Exodus 35:5b, 21)

When it came time to build the Old Testament tabernacle, the Lord moved Moses to speak to the people of Israel and ask them to provide all the contributions needed for building the tabernacle. Day after day, they kept on bringing contributions and offering their skills for the completion of this worthy project. (Exodus 35:2-29)

The generosity of the people continued to grow and grow until those who were in charge of the building of the tabernacle came to Moses and said, "'The people bring much more than enough for doing the work that the LORD has commanded us to do.' So Moses gave command, and word was proclaimed through the camp, 'Let no man or woman do anything more for the contribution for the sanctuary.' So the people were restrained from bringing, for the material they had was sufficient to do all the work, and more." (Exodus 36:5-7)

It is helpful to remember that the people were not commanded to bring their contributions, but they were bringing their gifts from generous hearts. Generosity is contagious. It is easy to imagine that as some people started bringing their gifts, others joined in until there were many more contributions than needed to complete the building of the sanctuary. This account from the Book of Exodus is an encouragement to practice freewill and generous giving for the work of the Lord. Once such freewill generosity gets underway, God's people catch the spirit of generosity and marvelous things happen!

Specific to Sherman Oaks Lutheran Church, as of Jan. 31, 2024, our accumulated congregational giving is at the highest it has been for the last five years when measured at the same point in time over the previous five years. So, as of January 31, 2019, and each subsequent January 31 through 2023, there has been no higher accumulated total than the one we just passed on 1/31/2024! That is wonderful news and evidence that the spirit of generosity is at work in our congregation! Let's keep the generosity "contagion" [an influence that spreads rapidly] going strong so that we can joyfully participate in the LORD's work.





A Message from Pastor...

Confirmation and First Communion

Over the past several months, the elders and I have been discussing our church's practice regarding confirmation and first communion and have put together a proposal which we plan to present to the congregation at the Spring congregation meeting. I want to put before you now with a few more details and why I believe this proposal leads us to a more Scriptural practice. Ultimately my hope for this article is that you will grow in your biblical under-standing of the Lord's Supper and what it means to receive it faithfully.

The Proposal: Separate First Communion and Confirmation

The proposal is to admit to the Lord's Supper any child (regardless of age) once they have done the following: 1) they have been baptized, 2) learn by heart the 10 Commandments, Apostle's Creed, and Lord's Prayer, and can explain in their own words what baptism and the Lord's Supper are, 3) meet with the pastor (along with parents) for instruction specific to receiving the Lord's Supper, and 4) can demonstrate to the pastor and their elder a basic understanding of the foundational elements of faith.

Also note: This does not change anything about confirmation. Children who go through this process would still be expected to go through confirmation.

The Reasoning and Biblical Basis

The fundamental guide in establishing our communion practice (and every other practice for that matter) must be Scripture. The Bible does give parameters on proper reception of the Lord's Supper, especially in 1 Corinthians 11:26-29. Recipients should:

- "examine themselves," (they know their sin and the forgiveness given in Christ).
- "discern the body," that is, they should know what they are receiving in this sacrament.
- The act of taking the Lord's Supper also "proclaims the Lord's death until he comes." Reception of the Lord's Supper proclaims our faith. An understanding of the basics, as taught in the catechism, is thus necessary.

These are the Scriptural requirements. The concern is that requiring confirmation before first

communion adds extra-biblical requirements which are foreign to Scripture.

It is helpful to know some of the history that led to where we are now. For most of the 1900's, the dominant

practice in Lutheranism has been to tie confirmation and First Communion together, with the two of them happening around age 14. However, this

had not always been the case. Luther himself did not teach "confirmation" at all and admitted children to communion when they were ready, often "8 years of age or younger." At times in Lutheran history, confirmation was a means for



preparing children to receive the Lord's Supper. In those instances, it was taught differently and to children of a younger age than is the case today. In the last couple of centuries, confirmation became less a preparation for the Lord's Supper and more of a "rite of passage" or a "time for children to take ownership of their faith." This resulted in the older age of catechumens and long process of confirmation we have now. More recently, there has been a realization of this in the LCMS, and many congregations (~30%) have separated first communion from confirmation.

I also want to briefly note that this process requires more direct parental involvement in teaching/preparing children. That is intentional because we believe from Scripture that it is the responsibility of the parent to teach faith to their children (Deuteronomy 6:6-9) and that it is best internalized that way.

Anyhow, this has been a rather short distillation of the proposal and Scripture behind it. I welcome and encourage questions and conversations! Also, we hope to hold a few "town-hall" style events to explain more fully the proposal and have helpful conversations.
